Long-termers in China





China is the country with the largest population in the world, but most of these people haven't had the chance to know our Savior the Lord Jesus. The Lord gave us such a vision 20 years ago. However, although we had the vision, we had to go through a long period of time in waiting upon the Lord, learning to minister to people physically and spiritually, getting professional training, Mandarin language study, and doing some short terms of teaching in China. Finally, the Lord allowed us to go and live in China for 3 years. We worked in a small town and lived in a small village. It wasn't easy to be accepted by the villagers since we were considered as foreigners. Because of this, we experienced some persecution

especially after we first moved there. We thank the Lord that He gave us some opportunities to show love and help the villagers. They then slowly got to know our intention to be there to help them.

Our main responsibility in that place was to do teacher training, and so we built a lot of relationships with teachers as we worked with them and had them over for social times. They had received a university education, yet their understanding of Christianity was very limited or almost non-existent because of the atheistic teaching they had received. We thank the Lord that through teaching English, we were able to integrate Christian values and attitudes in our teaching, and share Christ's love. As we spent our lives there with them over these few years, trying to help them in many ways, they also trusted us more. We were then able to build up deeper relationships with them. Over the 3 years we were there, many short termers came from North America to help us in programs. Their input to interact with our students helped alot to ease the way for us as long-termers to share the good news to them when they asked.

God taught us a lot. We had real constant tough times but also built many wonderful close relationships. We learned the importance of a long-term presence in building relationships and in following-up on excellent work done by short-term workers. Now, we are back and seeking the Lord in closer intimacy to see the way further. Have you caught the vision? The vision of a China energized and rejuvenated by the Spirit of the Lord. Yes, a China, the most populous country in the world, sending out workers to all the nations. Let's work for it, that God might bless this great nation and people, and that they might be a blessing to the entire world.

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Q&A Kathy Wong

Kathy Wong joined the MSI English Teaching team in July. She taught at the Traditional Chinese Medicine University in Chengdu.

- 1. What was your greatest experience during this trip?
- K: I experienced how God first prepared me, then equipped me, used me & worked with me step by step. This was all done in His way and in His time. I felt God has accompanied me throughout the whole process; I was not alone. While in China, I was just completely focused on English Teaching for the entire 3 full weeks. The result came out 10 times better than I expected. His name is glorified at the end.
- 2. Did you feel home sick during the trip?
- K: Yes and No. I believe it is more God's timing to send me rather than my own planning. I had to finish or even put aside my current responsibilities for family/job/church before I left for the trip. After I came back I had to catch up with the work for weeks. I missed my family & the unfinished life goal in Canada but I learnt to leave everything in God's hand.
- 3. What made you decide to join this trip?
- K: I was first called to commit myself for short-term mission in 1996 through Dr James Taylor's mission message in Vancouver. Dr. Taylor is the founder of MSI, and many from various generations of the Taylor family served in China. Their godliness & devotion to God and the Chinese deeply touched me. I told God that I'm willing to go to China when it is His time. God took my response seriously & made me wait for 6 years.
- 4. Do you think you will go back to China again?
- K: It was not easy at all for me to save my holiday & money to go. I thought I could only go once. However, I now realise that China is such a tremendously huge harvest field, and the workers are

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few. I don't know if I will go back again, but if God calls me again, and I am 100% clear it is God who is moving me in that direction, I will go again. If it is from God, He alone will take care of everything.

5. How did the Chinese respond to Christian?

K: MSI has a good reputation in China and a good relationship with the local officials. The school & students knew we were Christians right from the first day. Many students are curious how we could give up so much to go just to support their foreigner language teaching for 3 weeks without pay. They are touched by this, and by our Christian attitudes. One of the students who is a teacher herself said to me that she would bring the same passion back to her own classroom. Some of them are sincerely searching. I have been consistently praying for them. They are gentle & loving people; and I did not even realize I could love them so much. We had a great opportunity to build relationship & to share God's love & grace with them personally. We don't know how much longer China will still be open for the professionals to go. I will encourage any of you to pray for yourself & to be more sensitive to God's personal call when He comes to ask you.

- 1. Praise the Lord that MSI Canada's registration for charitable status has been granted by Revenue Canada. Thank God for His provision and the hard work by Mr. Philip Lowe our accountant and Mr. Bill Lim our legal counsel.
